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Questions for Study and Discussion

1. As we begin a study of the life of David, what would you say are David's greatest achievements and his greatest failures? What are some of his best character qualities? What were his greatest weaknesses? What does the life of David tell us about God's grace?
2. David was anointed king because of the failure of Saul. Read 1 Samuel 15. What did Saul do that cost him the throne? How does Saul seek to justify his actions to Samuel? In what ways is it very easy for us to follow in Saul's footsteps of self justification?
3. Samuel is sent to Bethlehem and the house of Jesse? This is a fulfillment of prophecy on a number of levels. Read Genesis 49:1-10; 2 Samuel 7:14-17; and Revelation 5:1-5. How do these passages point back and forward to God's choice in Bethlehem that day?
4. In 1 Samuel 15:5-11, Samuel is shown the sons of Jesse. How is God's choice a king different than man's? How is what we intuitively look for (1 Samuel 9:1,2) very often not God's criteria for leadership? How does our choice of a leader reflect our own heart?
5. God affirms to Samuel that David is His choice. Knowing the life of David, what is it about him that God sees? See Psalms 63 and Psalm 51. Can you think of other Scriptures that reflect David's heart before God?
6. God commands Samuel to anoint David. What is the significance of this action? How does this parallel, in some ways, the action of John the Baptist toward our Lord in Matthew 4:13-17?
7. In concluding, what principles can you draw from this passage about the type of person the Lord chooses to use for His glory?

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
